- During bowel movements
- After straining
- When hemorrhoids become irritated by hard stool

Patients may notice bright red blood on toilet paper or in the toilet bowl. Although painless bleeding can be caused by hemorrhoids, it should always be properly evaluated by a medical professional.

Other Causes of Rectal Bleeding

While hemorrhoids are a frequent cause of rectal bleeding, other medical conditions may produce similar symptoms.

These may include:

- Anal fissures
- Colon polyps
- Inflammatory bowel disease
- Colorectal cancer

For this reason, persistent bleeding should never be ignored.
